I have an unpleasant and very unfortuneate task. For a variety of reasons--most of which are unclear to me--the Pastor's institute has been cancelled as an ecumenical venture and is now going to take a severely reduced form as a Presbyterian program. At the final count only 16 persons had signed up and most of those were Presbyterians. Because it is now being scaled down we cannot afford to have a convocation and we must cancel two of the classes. I am so very sorry that the program fell through. Our greatest loss-is not being able to have you with us to do a convocation. I am very sorry for the inconveniences this will cause you! I wish there were some way that I could change everything.

The task now is to mend some ecumenical walls, modify the program and carry out a prediminary program with the hope that it will set the pace for a better ecumenical participation next year. I am sorry to be the bearer of such news! I would be as sorry if we had arranged for Professor Moltmann and this happened. Thank you for all your work, support and thoughtful encouragement. For now it is to the future! Have a good year. I am sorry I missed you when I called. I hope that your vacation has been good. I will calleyou when I return next week. I am enclosing some reviews of your book. I plan to be reading it next week at the coast.

Dear Doug:

I enclose the ill-fated letter of June 18, together with a copy of my vita.

I guess I am flattered to be considered as a stand-in for Jürgen Moltmann, for I really believe he is one of the top two or three spokespersons within Christendom at the present time. Possibly for that reason primarily I demured a bit when you asked about my own interest. I want now to emphasize how much I would look forward to such an opportunity. I am a university professor, but I have conducted pastor's retreats on several occasions, frequently in ecumenical settings. Recent ones have been sponsored by Pacific Lutheran University (Lutheran Institute for Theological Education) in Tacoma, Washington, the American Lutheran Church (Pacific Southwest District), and the Renewal Institutes for priests and nuns (for five years) at the Franciscan Old Mission here in Santa Barbara. In May I gave a public lecture at the Divinity School in the University of Chicago. I mention these as instances of my experience in theological and pastoral settings.

I've also enclosed a copy of the latest book. It would be on one or another of the themes implicit there that I'd like to speak on September 23 and 24.

Again, my deepest regrests for not being able to pull a Moltmann visit together.

It was very helpful to talk with you yesterday about the upcoming Moltmann event.

Moltmann's lectures, on the general theme of "Spirituality and Liberation" -- our title, not his -- are the following:

Worship -- the Liberating Feast

Liberation -- Hope in Action

Creation as Open System

Let's also give his wife a time period in the schedule. She may decide not to do it, but I'd like to give her place on the program. Her title is "Women's Liberation in Germany: Obstacles and Advantages."

My title is"Action and Contemplation: Alternating Currents".

I am writing a news story for the Lutheran church publications on the west coast. The draft is enclosed.

I am writing to a few of you, to explore a prospect projected now for the summer of 1976.

I would like to establish a Santa Barbara Summer Theological Conference which would devote a full week to contemporary trends or developments on the cutting edge of theology. I conceive the Conference as an annual event, scheduled for mid or late August (following the completion of most summer sessions). It should be self-supporting (through the tuition of participants), staffed by local personnel supplemented by outstanding visiting lecturers. I believe that the week might coincide with vacation time for some persons, or families, so that its temper would be both intellectual and contemplative, though not rigidly academic. In this regard, I would think it useful to work out informal relationships with various institutions (colleges, seminaries, the Old Mission, La Casa, perhaps the University, etc.), and perhaps even informal sponsorship, particularly for the benefit of students who might want to receive credit for participating. But the Conference would be designed to meet a cross-section of interests and needs, and would be understood as something other than a course of studies.

To be more specific, in addition to local luminaries, I know that we could bring Jürgen Moltmann to Santa Barbara for this purpose in mid-August, 1976. My thought is that we should ask him to speak everyday for the entire week, then utilize others during other hours of the day to deal with issues of real currency in theology and religion. It would be worthwhile, for example, to talk about cross-cultural religious dialogue, new developments in biblical interpretation, developing understanding of the status of women, surveys of other recent trends in religion and theology, the increasing interest in spirituality, etc. I also believe that we could find the proper format to allow the hard intellectual work to be interrelated with worship.

I would think that a tuition charge of say \$75 to \$100 for the week, with appropriate reductions for students, would make the opportunity possible for most participants. The bulk of the fees would be devoted to making it possible to bring someone of Moltmann's stature to Santa Barbara, summer after summer. But

The cost of the conference is \$125 per adult person, including registration fees, meals, and lodging. Special commuter (non-residence) rates are also available, as are tickets for Dr. Moltmann's lectures.

Dear friend Jürgen:

It was simply wonderful to be with you and the Meeks in St.

Louis a few days ago. I am still somewhat amazed at how it came about. It was so very, very unexpected, and so very satisfying and inspiring. I thought that I had taken some paths into new territory, only to discover that you had been there all the time. It may be an unrealistic thought, but I would wish that I could come to Tübingen for an academic quarter, like from mid-March into mid-June, to be able to listen to you at length once again, to get the German language under a little better control so that I can read Eckhart, Suso, Tauler, and the others with more confidence. We're dreaming about this. So far it is only a dream, but I'm also serious.

We're having a little difficulty, however, with the August-September schedule. The folks in the Northwest are resisting the revision of schedules we discussed. The reason is that the weekend of September 4-6 is the Labor Day weekend here. Most people use it as the last chance to have family vacations. And our hosts in Portland and Tacoma believe that they will have low attendance.

Just as these discussions are occurring over the telephone, I received another telephone call from the University of Oregon in Eugene, Oregon. The people there want you for two days in mid-September, September 16-17, that is Thurdday and Friday, for a state-wide pastors' conference. They are offering \$300 each for two talks, or a total of \$600, plus travel expenses roundtrip from Princeton. My suggestion is that the event in Portland be re-scheduled for September 17-19, that is, as an extension of the Eugene, Oregon conference. I would expect the Portland people to offer an equal amount, or more, so that you could expect approximately \$1200 in honorarium in addition to travel expenses for one person from Princeton and return. It would be necessary to travel to Eugene on Wednesday, September 15, and you could be back in Princeton on Sunday night, September 19.

They have not cancelled the earlier time, but it is difficult for them especially since the bulk of it must occur on the Labor Day weekend.

Please let me know how you would like for me to arrange this.

If the Northwest event can be rescheduled, you would be free to leave the west coast together, as a family, after the close of whatever Charles McCoy has you doing in the Berkeley area.

Again, thank you for the wonderful time in St. Louis. I didn't intend that my discipleship should continue, willy-nilly, regardless of whatever independence I felt compelled to cultivate. But I find that I am still disciple, happily so, and that the several hours we had together in St. Louis were just thoroughly rewarding.

Dear Don,

The many details for the Moltmann Conference have not been worked out yet, but I do have a number of them, and want to pass them on to you.

Notice the enclosed tentative schedule. It includes some empty spaces, and yet gives an idea of a workable time. I have listed three evening presentations by Moltmann himself; the thought here is that this would be the most available time for persons coming just to hear him, whom we could charge differently than the others. I've also included space for Moltmann's wife, who is a highly trained and interesting speaker. My thought here is that following an afternoon break, for rest and/or relaxation, we'd ask people to gather again, say, at 4 o'clock, prior to supper, for something somewhat informal. Mrs. Moltmann could lead these two sessions. Then, we'll ask Moltmann to give his final talk right prior to the close of the conference on Saturday morning.

I've listed James Wiggins and Dick Comstock as speakers, in addition to the one shot that I'm requesting for myself. This is not a complete roster, but will give us something to say right now should persons be writing for information.

W. Richard Comstock is Professor of Religious Studies at UCSB, and works in the field of religious studies and contemporary theology.

James Wiggins is Professor of Religious Studies at Syracuse University in New York. His most recent book is RELIGION AS STORY, published by Harper & Row.

Walter H. Capps is Professor of Religious Studies and Director of the Institute of Religious Studies, UCSB. He has two previous books on the theology of hope, the first THE FUTURE OF HOPE, and the second TIME INVADES THE CATHEDRAL. And a third, dealing directly with Moltmann's work, will be published in April, 1976 under the title HOPE AGAINST HOPE.

(I've written these paragraphs this way in the event that they will become necessary information items in response to queries.)

We need at least one more faculty persons and we ought to have someone functioning as chaplain. I'm working on both of these, and will have something to report soon. I've also tried to devise some breakdown of anticipated expenses. So far, it looks something like this:

Honoraria and Travel Expenses:

for the Moltmann family James Wiggins W. Richard Comstock 5 1,000 minimal 800 " free (in lieu of any conferen fees)

These are minimal, as I say. In other words, I've worked this out in a several stage plan, depending on the response.

- (1) If the response is not good, then we only pay Moltmann a minimal honorarium, and the rest of us work for free. (20-25 participants)
- (2) If we can be assured of \$2500 or so to work with, then we can confirm Wiggins' participation, and pay other participants something. (50 participants)
- (3) Depending upon the size of the response, we can add significant names to the roster, and pay Moltmann more.

Also, while not being anxious to appear greedy, if the response allows it, I'll need some expense money for myself as participant and organizer of the conference. Because of the way in which the schedule is working out, I'll be in Oregon the two weeks prior to the conference, and must return immediately following. It will cost me \$300 to do this.

These are the reflections I have up until now. They remain in process.

And I'll have more soon.

Notice too the enclosed announcement draft. Until we have something more definite, I believe it can be used to give to people who inquire.

Dear Walt:

Thank you for your good letter of March 12. It is taken me this long to answer, I trust, because of the very heavy schedule of the last couple weeks of an academic quarter.

Some of the questions you ask about Moltmann's visit are easy to answer. The easiest: Frau Moltmann -- Elizabeth by name -- is a superb theologian, a gifted speaker, and one you would very much enjoy listening to. She is prepared to speak about "women's liberation in Germany," as well as a number of other topics. My understanding is that she works in the area of religion and ethics. We are going to make use of this opportunity here, and Charles McCoy is "billing" both of the Moltmanns for his seminar at the GTU.

I think we understand each other regarding the Northwest portion of the itinerary. My involvement is somewhat questionable. As it stands we will come to Oregon for my parents' 50th anniversary in mid-August, but will return to Santa Barbara for the Moltmann conference by August 24. Right now, we're contemplating the possibility of my coming back alone for those conference days, then returning to the Northwest for another week, with family, at Holden Village. The Holden Village week would begin on Sunday evening, August 29th. But, as I say, this is somewhat tentative. We would finish at Holden in time to get in on your conference, if this is appropriate, but I really hadn't intended to stay on to be with Moltmann in Portland. That's really a bit too much, I believe, mostly because of family logistics. So I would advise you to work out Moltmann's itinerary with Joe Smith for the week of Sept. 6 ff. Moltmann will do what we ask.

Regarding his travel from place to place, you should know that he will have his wife and two daughters with him. This makes plane travel a bit expensive. I do expect him to fly from San Francisco to Seatac, however, because of the length of time it would take to drive.

I hope this clarifies some of the questions. I think we have a good opportunity, and it is good to work together. That was the intention of our "Summer 1975 Pact," as you recall, and Father Virgil and Birger Pearson were witnesses.

Dear Jürgen:

It was a pleasure to receive your letter of January 2, and also to have the topics on which you are prepared to lecture in this country.

I have been in touch with Charles McCoy about your possible schedule in western United States. This is how I project the situation now: Berkeley and the Bay Area, beginning Saturday night, August 28, through Sunday, September 5; Santa Barbara, the days immediately preceding, that is, August 24 or 25 through August 28, leaving Santa Barbara on Saturday evening, August 28, for Stanford. This leaves open the time between your conference in Colorado and the conference in Santa Barbara. It was Charles' impression that you wanted this time to be able to drive from Colorado to southern California, to be able to visit the Grand Canyon, Consequently, we are leaving the week of the 16th open, and invite you to come early, if you'd like, to La Casa de Maria. Well, there's been lots of action! That's California talk, I'm afraid, but it's positive, promising, and hopeful.

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Your interest in coming here has prompted me to set several things in motion. First off, some of us in the area have been wanting to establish an annual Santa Barbara Summer Theological Conference. This will not be University funded, but will rely on the tuition of participants. By setting the same in the beautiful environment of La Casa de Maria (which you and Elizabeth know very well), we can also make it appealing for families and for family vacations. So, this is our first hope. We'd like to begin on Wednesday, August 25, and run through the weekend, possibly even into Monday and Tuesday of the following week. Don George, the Director of La Casa de Maria, encouraged me to invite you to come to La Casa early, that is, before the 25th, for some rest and relaxation. As you know, the place is not far from the beautiful blue Pacific (no oil slicks anymore) in the Montecito foothills.

Then, I have authority to invite you to the majestic Pacific Northwest following your stay in Santa Barbara. The Lutheran Institute for Theological Education in Tacoma, Washington -- associated with Pacific Lutheran University there -- is making plans for an early autumn theological conference (to which I will be invited, as well). Possibly, this will be held some place in the Cascade Mountains -- Mt. Rainier is in the area -- or on the campus of Pacific Lutheran University. I can perceive possibly a week of work for you in that region, for the large Lutheran church in downtown Portland, Oregon (near Portland State University) is also inviting you for a two-to-three day period, either before or after the conference in Tacoma. The interesting feature of the Portland invitation is that it includes a day's fishing expedition in the Pacific Ocean off the Oregon coast, where the salmon ought to be very plentiful. One of the men there has a large fishing boat, and is an experienced fisherman.

I can foresee a schedule something like this: Santa Barbara from August 25th through August 30th or 31st; Berkeley, with the McCoy's, following that; the week beginning September 6th in the Pacific Northwest, possibly Tacoma first, then, closer to the weekend, in Portland.

I can't be as sure of the size of the honorarium, but we can be more specific about this soon, as plans develop.

So, if I don't mature as a theologian and a scholar in religious studies, I can always enter the travel business. You can see that I put "first things first" in arranging this itinerary.

Please give me some indication, however, if this meets with your approval. I'm going to be handicapped somewhat in about three weeks, for we are going to Syracuse University for a visiting appointment for the fall semester. But my mail will be forwarded, and I have good assistance here in Santa Barbara during my absence.

My thought for the Santa Barbara conference is that you would give a lecture, or presentation, each day perhaps, and that we supplement this with lectures or presentations persons living closer by. I would like to get into it, and so would my colleague, Dick Comstock. Raimundo Panikkar may be in the area then too, and I have a good Benedictine friend, Vincent Martin, who is a master in western spirituality. Elizabeth could have a role too, if she would like. And I'm sure that some of the sisters of the Immaculate Heart order will want to participate. I'm enclosing a copy of the letter I sent after deciding to do something specific. Thank you so much for prompting us.

It's wonderful to think about all of this. I very much hope that it will happen. And I also hope you will get a good vacation and some refreshment out of it.

Dear

I am writing to a few of you, to explore a prospect projected now for the summer of 1976.

I would like to establish a Santa Barbara Summer Theological Conference which would devote a full week to contemporary trends or developments on the cutting edge of theology. I conceive the Conference as an annual event, scheduled for mid or late August (following the completion of most summer sessions). It should be self-supporting (through the tuition of participants), staffed by local personnel supplemented by outstanding visiting lecturers. I believe that the week might coincide with vacation time for some persons, or families, so that its temper would be both intellectual and contemplative, though not rigidly academic. this regard, I would think it useful to work out informal relationships with various institutions (colleges, seminaries, the Old Mission, La Casa, perhaps the University, etc.), and perhaps even informal sponsorship, particularly for the benefit of students who might want to receive credit for participating. But the Conference would be designed to meet a cross-section of interests and needs, and would be understood as something other than a course of studies.

To be more specific, in addition to local luminaries, I know that we could bring Jürgen Moltmann to Santa Barbara for this purpose in mid-August, 1976. My thought is that we should ask him to speak everyday for the entire week, then utilize others during other hours of the day to deal with issues of real currency in theology and religion. It would be worthwhile, for example, to talk about cross-cultural religious dialogue, new developments in biblical interpretation, developing understanding of the status of women, surveys of other recent trends in religion and theology, the increasing interest in spirituality, etc. I also believe that we could find the proper format to allow the hard intellectual work to be interrelated with worship.

I would think that a tuition charge of say \$75 to \$100 for the week, with appropriate reductions for students, would make the opportunity possible for most participants. The bulk of the fees would be devoted to making it possible to bring someone of Moltmann's stature to Santa Barbara, summer after summer. But

there should also be some remainder to provide modest honoraria to other lecturers and presentors.

Please let me know if you have reactions to this. I'd also appreciate whatever ideas you might have. I believe I've done enough initial probing to be confident that this is a lively prospect which would meet a real need.

Dear Jürgen:

I was very pleased to receive your letter this morning. I'm delighted that you are planning to be in our part of the world in 1976.

You must have known that I had been thinking about you -- each day lately, in fact. I've been working on another study of hope themes, this one called HOPE AGAINST HOPE, and it should be out in January, 1976, under Fortress Press publication. I'm sure this won't shock you, but you will take interest in the thesis that Moltmann and Merton are not awfully far apart theologically. I know that one is in political theology and the other became a hermit -- you can guess which is which! -- but I do find some common themes, particularly in the analysis of alienation. I'm working on this point these days; the book should be finished in less than a month.

I'll see what I can do about arranging a conference. Perhaps we can do something here in Santa Barbara, but I also have involvements in Washington State, at a beautiful (like Norway) mountain retreat center owned by the Lutherans in Oregon and Washington. The price might be my appearing on the same program with you, which I would love. And perhaps we can arrange something in both places.

I cannot be definite now, but I'll go to work on it immediately. It is very helpful to know that you are definitely coming.


