School prayer: an alternative

There is something that has not been said in all of the debate about the initiatives to amend the Constitution to allow an appropriate form of vocal prayer, silence or meditation in the classrooms of the public schools. This is that there is a way to bring religion into the schools in a manner that does no violence to principles regarding the separation of church and state. It is a way, too, that is in keeping with Chief Justice Burger's statement in the Pawtucket, R.I. case that support can be given to the "passive" rather than "active" presence of religion within the public domain. Furthermore, it is a way that even carries the recommendation of Thomas Jefferson, whose statement about the necessary "wall of separation between the church and the state" has been quoted frequently these past days.

In a letter of Jan. 23, 1805, to Samuel Miller, a Presbyterian minister, Jefferson called prayer (alongside of which he mentioned fasting) a "religious exercise, the enjoining of which is an act of discipline," and declared that it is in the best interest of religion "not to invite the civil magistrate to direct its occurrence." He reiterated his conviction that "civil powers alone have been given to the president of the United States, but no authority to direct the religious exercises of his constituents." Addressing the other side of the issue on March 13, 1815, in a letter to P. H. Wendover, Jefferson offered that "preachers should stick to lessons in religion," and not presume "to offer discourse on the construction of government or the character or conduct of those administering it."

But Thomas Jefferson also believed that there are appropriate ways of approaching the subject of religion within the public domain, yes, even within public education. In setting forth guiding principles for the estab-

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lishment of the University of Virginia, in 1814, he urged that there be no professor of divinity on the faculty, for this would confuse the issue. But he wanted a professor of ethics to teach about religion, using the methods and interpretation practiced within the university.

Why not follow Jefferson's counsel? Instead of legislating symbolic gestures involving complicated constitutional issues, raising practical difficulties within the classroom, while provoking prolonged controversies on a host of issues, why not take firmer and clearer steps to include religion within the curriculum of public education, that is, in educational rather than religious form? Why not have programs of study to examine religion's place in a democratic society, its influences over civilizations and cultures east and west, and, in particular, its contributions to cherished American values?

The same educational experiment has been undertaken successfully, with confirmed intellectual quality, in selected public colleges and universities. Indeed, the religious studies program at the University of California, Santa Barbara has led the way nationally in this respect. Clearly the time has come to create educational equivalents in the primary and secondary schools.
