How to survive in a technocracy

A PROFESSOR OF RELIGION who believes man ultimately can master technology will give the final lecture on Thursday, May 27, in Cal Poly's Arts and Humanities series.

The presentation by Dr. Walter H. Capps will begin at 11 a.m. in Room 220 of the Julian A. McPhee University Union on campus.

Capps, who teaches religious studies at the University of California at Santa Barbara, is president of the Council on the Study of Religion.

He formerly was director of the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions in Santa Barbara.

Capps' topic will be "Technology and Human

Values: Can the Impasse be Overcome?"

The lecture is open to the public. No admission will be charged. Visitor parking can be arranged at the Administration Building for those who arrive on campus well in advance of the lecture.

Capps is expected to talk about what he sees as a dualism between the sense of reality in the humanities and that in the sciences and technologies. He believes that those in the fields often view that which is valuable and desirable as being different and distinct — which need not be the case.

Referring to the Presidential Commission's report on Global 2000 and Theodore Roszek's "Person Planet," he is expected to propose that the humanities can be used to enhance a reasoned appreciation of technological change.

Capps' books in progress are "The Monastic Impulse: Engaging the World by Mirror Contrast" and "The Unfinished War: Vietnam and the American Conscience."

At UCSB, he brought former South Dakota Senator and presidential candidate George McGovern and California Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. into the classroom as guests for his course in "Religion and Politics in America Today."

Capps' talk is the 12th and final presentation in the series sponsored by the School of Communicative Arts and Humanities. The 1981-82 series, coordinated by Dr. Pamela Miller of the Speech Communication Department, focused on "Technology and Human Values."
